Will it be a white Christmas

No, it's just the annual seeding of the aspens—or are they cottonwoods?

Curiosity got the better of me, so I Googled poplars, aspens, and cottonwoods. I quickly regretted it! The Populus genus (named because the Romans planted them in public places) includes 57 species across seven groups.

If you search "aspen," Google leads you to the Populus Populus group, particularly Populus tremula, or "trembling aspen," which is common in Europe and Asia. Meanwhile, "cottonwood" points to the Populus Aigeiros group, especially Populus deltoides, the Eastern cottonwood, one of the most widespread trees in North America.

Both tremula and deltoides are dioecious, meaning only female trees produce seeds, dispersed in fluffy, cotton-like tufts (possibly the origin of "a bit of fluff"). Tremula has smooth grey bark and spreads via suckers, often sprouting far from the parent tree. In contrast, deltoides has deeply fissured bark and spreads solely by

For these reasons, I believe our "aspens" are actually American Eastern cottonwoods.

P.S. The terms "aspen" and "cottonwood" are often used interchangeably, adding to the confusion.



Havana Bananas

Do you throw out vour bananas



You need:

- 2 over-ripe bananas
- 2 Tsp butter
- 2 Tsp brown sugar
- 2-3 Tsp brown rum

Method: Put the butter and sugar in a non-stick pan over low-medium heat until it starts to caramelise. Meanwhile skin the bananas, cut them in half lengthwise and add to the pan turning so as to coat each side with the caramel mix.

Option 1: Remove the pan from the heat, add the rum and light with a match. The alcohol will burn off and the heat will add to the flavour.

Option 2: Leave pan on stove and just add the rum. Simmer for a couple of minutes- the alcohol will evaporate.

Serve: on 2 dessert plates with 2-3 scoops of Vanilla or French Vanilla ice-cream on top (this will start to melt on the warm banana mix). Yum!!
